COURSE DESCRIPTION

Sidewalk University is a week long, site-specific course with rotating cities and topics. The course is conducted in the Spring Semester and involves a mandatory Winter Term trip to the selected destination. Sidewalk University is an experiential, reflective, and proactive immersion course that focuses on timely and relevant topics in a different city annually. In the spring of 2016, Sidewalk University will investigate disability and the arts with New York City as the classroom from January 11-16. New York is synonymous with the arts, offering an ideal landscape for concentrated investigation into disability, art and aesthetics. New York allows us to observe first hand how art can empower the disabled, but moreover, how the disabled can empower art. For the purposes of this course, disability will be broadly defined (i.e. developmental, physical, psychosocial, etc.). While the course includes scheduled meetings on the EKU campus throughout the semester, the greatest concentration of our activities will take place during the January trip to New York. Students will fully participate in all aspects of the site visits as well as complete the Journal + Tumblr prompts including a NYC Accessibility Scavenger Hunt. Once back on campus, students will propose, outline, create and present a Final Research Project and Paper based on a topic relevant to the course. The focus of this diversity course is to facilitate a deeper understanding of disability through studying aesthetics. What is disability? How does disability inform aesthetics and the arts? What makes someone disabled? How does art benefit the disabled, but moreover, how does the disabled benefit art?

- 3. Practice an understanding of the challenges faced by disabled populations.
- 4. Learn frameworks for research-driven advocacy and activism related to the issues of disability, access and creativity.
- 5. Analyze the above terms and concepts specific to New York City compared with central and eastern Kentucky.

GRADING SCALE

Grades will be assigned based on the quality of work observed and turned in to the instructor. No extra credit options are available nor will late work be accepted without professor approval. PROJECTS

1. Attendance, Conduct & Participation /// 200 points

Attendance is required for all class and trip functions including all pre- and post-travel class meetings. Attendance includes following all trip guidelines during travel, EKU Student Code of Conduct, punctuality and participating fully in all trip events and activities. You each represent EKU Honors, a good attitude and open minds are a must!

2. Tumblr + Journal /// 250 points

Students are required to keep a physical journal for Sidewalk University. Students will share some journal entries on the class Tumblr. Journals include class notes and assigned journal entries in response to prompts provided by the instructors. Students are expected to write their un-prompted thoughts, reflections, and revelations about the trip and experience in general. Class notes, drawings, doodles, sketches, poems, and other creative means of expression are not only welcomed, but encouraged. Students will select various journal entries to share on our class Tumblr during our trip and throughout the semester. Refer to Journal + Tumblr Handout for options & instructions.

3. NYC Scavenger Hunt /// 50 Points

While in New York City, students will conduct observational research on disabled access by locating and documenting particular public design from a list of provided prompts. Refer to handout provided and the "City as Text" explorations developed by Dr. Bernice Braid.

4. Final Paper & Project /// 400 points

Upon returning from NYC, each student will select a research project and topic specific to the course for further exploration. Students will write an in-depth paper based on their preferred focus. Please <u>select one</u> option from the three listed; each option does require a proposal, outline, rough draft and final paper to be turned in per the course calendar. Research topics are subject to professor approval. **ALL STUDENTS WILL PRESENT THEIR RESEARCH TOPICS AT THE END OF THE SPRING SEMESTER.**

- 1. Creative Option: Create a modest *body* of work (artwork) in a medium and technique of your choosing in combination with a <u>5-7 page</u> Research Paper related to the creative work. The art you generate should be informed by class topics, artists studied or encountered during Sidewalk University or influences you discover *after* the initial trip to NYC that are relevant to *Disability, The City & Aesthetics*. Refer to *Paper Requirements* below for additional details.
- 2. Service Learning Option: Select a local or regional institution that services disabled populations through creative means to volunteer or collaborate with. Some recommendations are provided, but students are welcomed to pick their own organization. Along with the service-learning component, students will write a 5-7 page Research Paper related to their

- service learning experience and *Disability, The City & Aesthetics*. Refer to *Paper Requirements* below for additional details.
- 3. Research Option: Based on course topics and experiences, students may elect to write a 10-12 page traditional research paper related to *Disability, The City & Aesthetics*. Refer to *Paper Requirements* below for additional details.

Paper Requirements

Regardless of what research project option you select, all papers should be well researched and well sourced. Follow the paper length outlined in the selections above. All papers will require appropriate citations and bibliographies in MLA or APA, depending on the students focus. It goes without saying papers should be in a standard 12-point typeface, double-spaced with 1-inch margins. Quality content counts more than length, so be your own ruthless editor. Research topics are subject to professor approval.

***Pay close attention to deadlines on the course calendar. Each project requires a <u>proposal</u>, <u>outline</u>, <u>rough draft and final paper</u>.

5. Mini Exhibition /// 100 Points

During the trip, since everyone is already keeping a journal, taking photographs and contributing to the Tumblr, we will extract some of your best photographs (and maybe doodles, sketches and journal entries) for a small exhibition. Location and dates are to be determined, but plan to submit a least one photograph by April 1st, for an exhibition in mid-late April. Those opting for the Creative Option for their Final Project will also be invited to share there work in the exhibition as well.

NYC TRIP GUIDELINES

No one, under any circumstances travels alone in New York. ALWAYS be in groups of at least two. If you are moving in a group of four or more, be prepared to split into smaller groups when going to restaurants. Be smart about your money; carry it and your ID(s) close to your body. When it says on the itinerary to meet somewhere at a specific time, please BE THERE. No one will be waited on when we're doing an activity. Make sure you have the instructors' and the trip assistant's cell phone numbers saved in your phone and use them, when necessary.

PACKING RECOMMENDATIONS

Pack light, but prepare for cold weather and lots of walking. Part of enjoying NYC is being mobile and not burdened by heavy luggage. Watch the weather closely prior to departure and pack accordingly. The Hostel provides WiFi in common areas, linens, bath towels, pillows and blankets. We recommend teaming up with a classmate to share certain items.

- Cash. NYC is a cash town. Also, cash makes it much easier to split restaurant bills. We recommend \$150 – 225 for food, entertainment and souvenirs.
- o A good cross body bag or purse with zippers to secure your belongings.
- o **Padlock**, there are small lockers in the rooms to secure personal items.
- Small sized toiletries.
- Course materials, class journal and a few things to draw or sketch with.
- o Prescription medicine you require in their prescription containers.
- o Refillable water bottle.
- Kleenex, vitamins, and cold meds in case you become ill.
- o **Do not bring** unnecessary technology, jewelry, keys, or other hard to replace items.
