Tell us about your internship:

My internship is with Pittsburg Tank & Tower in Henderson, KY. I work with EHS specialists, Site Safety Auditors, EHS Shop Managers, and the VP of Risk Management. Pittsburg Tank & Tower is one of the nation's top steel specialty contractors that provides construction, maintenance, inspection, and production services. During the construction and maintenance of water tanks, specialty tanks, radio towers, etc., Pittsburg Tank & Tower maintains a strong commitment on safety and risk management.

What led you to pursue a safety degree at EKU?

I view my degree in safety as a building block for my future endeavors. I feel that a degree in safety has no limits in the workplace when paired with the right experiences. Do you have a favorite class at EKU?

Why did you decide to pursue a graduate degree at EKU?

Truthfully, I did not know about the SSEM program until I had chanced upon a notice one of the facilitators of the program had made of them looking for a student for their NIOSH Grant. Though I knew that safety was a job someone could have at the time, I didn't realize that there were degree programs for it. I was a little directionless about what path I wished to take until I came across the post and reached out. Before this, I had some experience in the safety field through a volunteer-based committee at work and enjoyed the socialization and creativity surrounding some of the stuff I was doing as well as the technical aspects. When Dr. Dunlap reached back out to me to tell me about both the grant and a career in safety, I decided that pursuing the degree was a good choice to make.

Tell us about your favorite class in the SSEM program:

Though there are many good professors in the program, my favorite has been Dr. Scotty Dunlap. The textbooks that he writes and assigns are quite easy to digest and use real world examples and clever metaphors to put some concepts into perspective. His assignments are challenging but not too overwhelming. He remains engaged with his students and answers questions you may have. Even though I am an online student, even before I had the opportunity to meet him face to face, I could tell that he is passionate about a career in safety. He also had a knack for helping other people interested in a career in the field as well from helping you get more involved in the program via attending out-of-state conferences, getting you connected with companies who may be hiring, or helping students dip their toes in the world of networking.

Favorite professor or staff member?

My favorite professor is Dr. Spurlock. He is our faculty advisor with the ASSP student section of EKU which I am involved with. He is always patient and cares about students, school could be stressful sometimes and it is always great to reach out and receive help!

Something you learned in your Grad program that surprised you:

One of the most useful things that I learned in my graduate program was a lesson that was, I see now, apparent in many of the classes but had not completely clicked for me until I had attended the most recent National Safety Council Conference in New Orleans. I know it seems counterintuitive to a Grad student, but I learned that you do not need to be a complete expert.

There is this big idea among students, I believe, that you should be an expert in something if you are going to have a career in something and you cannot start that career until you are an expert. Expertise comes from experience. Nobody who started their career in safety was an expert first and those that are very versed in the subject are so because of other people.

There is this idea that you must shoulder this weight, the burden of all the responsibility falls to you. However, the world of safety management is always changing, and safety is a team sport. It is okay to not know something, but it is not okay to just say you do not know something and leave it at that. If you do not know something, then find someone who does and get help or learn about it yourself.

Advice for students that are interested in this program:

If I could give just one piece of advice for incoming students, it would be to manage your time wisely. There are many assignments in this program in which it may be prudent to look beyond just the current week so they can put the proper amount of time and effort into the projects at the end of each semester. There is a lot of "hands on" learning especially in the field study class where students are literally going to different job sites to assess their safety programs. Even beyond that, there are classes where students are to fabricate their own training and compliance programs

What was your highest degree earned? Doctor of Education in Higher and Adult Education – The University of Memphis

How long have you been at EKU?

Favorite class that you teach?

This is a tough question because I love teaching them all. I love teaching SSE 880 – Research and SSE 896 – Capstone because of the opportunity to make the research process more accessible to graduate students.

I love teaching SSE 865 - Auditing because I spent a great deal of my career in industry conducting safety management system audits and I see the process as a great conduit to improve organizational performance.

Advice for future/current students?

Though it might sound trite, follow your bliss. Find a path through either occupational safety, security, or emergency management that you can become passionate about and pursue it with vigor.

Second, if you are not currently employed in the field, engage in an internship while navigating your program of study. Internships provide the values of academic course credit toward degree completion, experiencing applied learning through work activities, gaining work experience that can be recorded on a resume, and building a relationship with an employer that could result in a full-time job offer.





Competitive Set Research


Competitive set comprised of **15 online Bachelors in Occupational Safety*** programs at both private and public universities.
