This academic year ushers in another change of leadership. The College of Letters, Arts, and Social Sciences has a new Dean (Dr. Mercy Cannon) and a new Associate Dean (Dr. John Bowes). Our former chair, Dr. Richard Osbaldiston has taken a new position with USC Beaufort. Dr. Jon Gore and I are currently serving as interim Associate Chair and Chair of the Department.



Brothers Run Foundation financially supports the work of our EKU Psychology Clinic with this fundraising suicide prevention event every year. We had 30 participants and was one of the largest teams that we have hosted.

The Department also hosted a suicide prevention workshop at El Centro de San Juan Diego in Lexington on September 7th, 2022. These are just two examples of the many initiatives that the EKU Psychology Department is spearheading in the efforts toward suicide prevention.



Research Spotlight: Multilingual Lab



Over 1,000 researchers attended the event in Boston, where Dr. Incera gave a talk about how appearance (the way a speaker looks) influence listeners perceptions of foreign accents.

The Multilingual Laboratory (Dr. Sara Incera and her undergraduate research assistants Angie Marroquin, Haleigh Hamilton, and Montserrat Cruz) attended the 63rd Annual Meeting of the Psychonomic Society. Psychonomic is the most important international association for researchers in the field of Cognitive Psychology.



PsyD Graduates 50th Student

This semester, 11 students earned Eastern's Doctor of Psychology (Psy.D.) degree, marking the 50th graduate from the program. Launched in the fall of 2015, the program graduated its first cohort of 4 students in 2018. The program was initially accredited on contingency by the American Psychological Association (APA) in April of 2018, shortly before the first cohort of students completed the program. EKU received full accreditation from APA for 10 years in 2020.





Graduate Program Update: Clinical Psy.D.

This fall, we moved the Psychology Clinic from Cammack to Rowlett and have started our return to in-person services. Much of our work in the Clinic is still being offered remotely due to client demand, but we have a high clinic load in the clinic as well and our new space is being well-used.

We also welcomed a new faculty member, Dr. Joshua Turner to the clinical faculty. Dr. Turner received his Ph.D. in Counseling Psychology with specialty emphasis tracks in Spanish counseling and integrated behavioral health from New Mexico State University in 2019. He completed his pre-doctoral internship with Veterans Affairs Healthcare System in Lexington, KY and his post-doctoral residency with Veterans Health Indiana in Indianapolis, IN. His clinical interests include bilingual counseling, trauma, primary care, LGBTQ+ and gender identity. His research interests include sizeism, healthism, body image, health disparities and equitability. Dr. Turner enjoys travel, reading historical fiction novels, poetry, mandala coloring books, and singing.



Graduate Program Update: General Psychology Master's Program

In the Experimental Psychology concentration of the General Pychology Master's program, three students completed their theses in Fall 2022. Evan Charles' thesis is entitled ""Scale validation of American Exceptionalism Index." Dr. Winslow was his mentor. Aaron Lankster's thesis is entitled "Factors contributing to feelings of inclusion and exclusion among Swahili-speaking refugees in Lexington, Kentucky." Dr. Gore was her mentor. Graduate Program Update: General Master, ABA Program, I/O Program

One piece of big news for the MS program in General Psychology is that Dr. Mitchell and Dr. Bundy completed and submitted the program review this semester.

A total of 15 students graduated from the ABA program at the Fall 2022 ceremony. We are proud of the work students and faculty have put into this program. This fall we hosted the ABA concentration's first online lunch time colloquium, featuring Dr. Robert Wallander speaking about "Treatment Integrity: You'll Never Look at a Behavior Plan the Same Way Again". Attendees included community members, faculty, and enthusiastic graduate students. We will host another online lunch colloquium in Spring 2023. We're looking forward to learning from Dr. Robert Pennington from UNC Charlotte.

Among the graduate students in the Experimental Master's program, Inés Elena Martín completed her Master's thesis entitled "The relationship between cognitive and linguistic abilities in bilingual children," under the direction of Dr. Sara Incera. Inés has accepted a position to start in the fall in a Ph.D. School Psychology program at Tulane University, in New Orleans.

The I/O Master's program completed its five year review. The Fall 2022 semester has been a good one for the I-O Psychology Master's program. Seventeen new students joined the program this Fall, and we are looking forward to having several additional new students join us for the Spring semester.

The program graduated 16 students this past Spring and Summer, and 10 students this Fall. This brings the total number of graduates from the online I-O program to 95 students! It is always great to meet our students in-person, and five were able to attend graduation in person this semester! We also were fortunate to

have five students join us for graduation in Spring 2022.



The program is gearing up for a busy Spring semester, with 20 students getting ready to begin their capstone projects. These projects allow students to gain practical experience in the field by completing an applied project for an organizational client. We will also be conducting interviews for a new I-O faculty member in the Spring. The I-O program is looking forward to a successful 2023!

The Animal Studies program as well as club had a great Fall 2022 semester. The Animal Studies Club took trips to the Reptile Zoo in Slade, Kentucky, where an Animal Studies alumnus works, as well as to the Cincinnati Zoo and Botanical Gardens. Additionally, Dr. Makecha was able to talk to the Animal Studies club about her recent experience at the International Wildlife Coexistence Conference at Chico Hot Springs in Pray, Montana. She also made a pit stop at a local grizzly bear rescue, the Montana Grizzly Encounter, who agreed to do a talk for the Animal Studies program in the near future.

The Animal Studies program is also looking forward to hosting its 5th Biennial Conference from March 9th – 11th, 2023, after a long hiatus due to COVID. The theme of the conference is Habitat and Home, including the subconferences of Living with Horses, Living with Art and Animals, and Living with Insects. Additionally, it will take place right here on EKU's campus. As always, the conference will be hosting an exciting array of keynote speakers, including Jo-Anne McArthur, a world-famous photographer who focuses on documenting the complex relationships between humans and non-human animals. Other keynote

speakers will include Gordon Burghardt, a world-renowned ethologist focusing on animal play, Terry Maple, an expert on animal welfare, Amy M. Youngs, who focuses on the interplay between technology, plants, and animals, most notably insects, and Jeannette Vaught, talking about locusts. The subconference Living with Horses is doing a panel discussion on "The Consideration of Equine Welfare within and Practice of Equine-Assisted Services," with three experts in the area: Veronica Lac, Nina Ekholm Fry, and Arieahn Matamonasa.

The program is also offering a study abroad course on Cetacean Ecology, Behavior, and Cognition in July of 2023 in Bimini, The Bahamas as well as a Biological Anthropology Field Methods course offered by Dr. Ben Freed during spring break. Through the study abroad course, students will learn how to study wild dolphin behavior as well as identify different species/individuals and through the field course, students will learn how to study lemurs through handson experience!





Veterans Study Program



The Kentucky Center for Veterans Studies marked its second year in fall 2022 and is still going strong. The student mentorship program pilot with the Lexington, KY Veterans Affairs medical center is moving forward into adoption. Students continue to benefit from internships, volunteer opportunities, and outsiders are taking notice of our curriculum can be paired with any number of professionalization tracks. The new VTS 500/700 Veteran Identity Theory capstone features the Editor-in-Chief of the *Journal of Veterans Studies*, who hopes to help undergraduate and graduate students in the program gain

skills and opportunities to publish. We will be introducing a new legislative advocacy group project in VTS 300 Veterans in Society, a partnership with Occupational Science. And our service-learning oral history project in the VTS 200 introductory course has now archived well over 1000 veterans' stories. Tell your students to take Veterans Studies courses if they want to grow as scholars and people.

Dr. Melinda Moore, Professor of Psychology and Coordinator of Suicide Awareness and Prevention, sat down with LEX 18 to talk about her work. Dr. Moore commented on the uptick in suicidal ideation among young people and the need for greater awareness across college campuses. Dr. Moore, along with EKU's Psychology Clinic, has hosted events such as "Walk for Hope" to increase the public's awareness of issues related to suicide.
